Course Overview and Learning Outcomes

White Collar Crime balances black letter law with current, high-profile examples of corporate felonies and fiascos. In this course, students will learn:

- (1) How to read and parse statutes, regulations and associated case law in order to identify and apply the elements of the following federal criminal offenses: conspiracy, mail fraud, wire fraud, securities fraud, false statements, obstruction of justice;
- (2) The requirements for both business enterprise liability and personal liability in an organizational setting; and
- (3) The legal standards and real-world practices for sentencing of defendants convicted for white collar criminal offenses.

Requirements

- Read the materials, submit exams, and attend and participate in class. Class participation factors into the final grade;
- Class participation (10%), midterm exam (20%) and take home final exam (70%); and
- Observe the attendance policy.

Attendance: Attendance is expected at every class session. Consistent with law school and ABA policy, students must attend at least 80% of class sessions in order to be eligible for credit.
