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Annette Martínez-Orabona is an international human rights lawyer and activist with extensive experience in national and international human rights protection systems. Currently, her work focuses on community-based legal advocacy to improve access to economic, social, and environmental rights in Puerto Rico. Under her leadership, a coalition of over 40 organizations produced several reports detailing the effects of austerity policies on the rights of vulnerable populations in Puerto Rico. Prof. Martínez-Orabona also coordinated the submission of written and oral testimony before the Inter-American Commission of Human Rights as well as UN Special Procedures on the ongoing humanitarian and human rights crisis after Hurricane María.
